Declaration and undertaking when applying to join the register.

Applicants must make a formal self-declaration and a Professional Commitment/Undertaking when joining the Register.

Professional Commitment/Undertaking

Applicants must make a formal self-declaration that they are;

- Currently practising, or have recently practised, as a pre-hospital emergency care practitioner and give evidence to support this.
- Current in their cardiac certification and training in the use of PHECC Clinical Practice Guidelines.
- Of good character. Have no relevant criminal conviction (any offence which would preclude an individual securing employment within the health sector).
- In good health. Have no known health condition or addiction that could affect their fitness to practise.

Applicants shall make a formal commitment to comply with the Code of Professional Conduct and Ethics and specific undertakings to:

- Complete Patient Care Reports.
- Practise only in accordance with their status on the PHECC register.
- Comply with Continuing Professional Competency requirements as approved by Council (on the recommendation of the Medical Advisory Group and the Clinical Care Committee).
- Cooperate with inquiries by the Fitness to Practice Committee and its two Subcommittees.
- Mentor or coach trainees or colleagues.

Notes;

Of Good Character. - Applicants must have no relevant criminal conviction (i.e. convicted of any offence which would preclude an individual from employment within the health sector). As part of the application process applicants will be required to make a declaration to this effect. PHECC reserve the right to request applicants to facilitate a clearance by An Garda Siochana (Irish Police) and also to request testimonials from relevant individuals of good standing (as decided by PHECC).

In Good Health. - Applicants must have no known health condition or addiction that could affect their fitness to practice. As part of the application process applicants will be required to make a declaration to this effect. PHECC reserve the right to request applicants to undergo a medical examination (as decided by PHECC) and submit the results for consideration.
